CONTRACT FOR CEI SERVICES ON MCCRAY GRADE



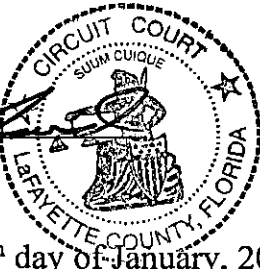

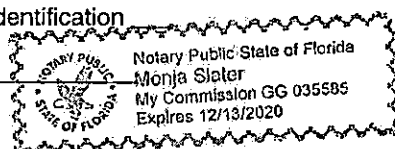

RFQ Title: PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERING SERVICES ON COUNTY ROAD 354 FOR LAFAYETTE COUNTY

The Lafayette County Board of County Commissioners will receive qualifications at the Clerk of Court's Office located at 120 West Main Street, Mayo, FL 32066, on Friday, February 28, 2020 by 4:00 p.m. The RFQ's will be opened at a Special Board Meeting on Tuesday, March 3, 2020 at 5:30 p.m..

Responders must submit one original and seven copies; and label on the outside of the envelope as "*RFQ – Professional Engineering Services on County Road 354 for Lafayette County*".

The Board of County Commissioners will receive sealed QUALIFICATIONS STATEMENTS from qualified individuals or firms to provide engineering services for Lafayette County.

Scope of Services: Engineering services will include, but not be limited to, planning, survey, design, permitting, procurement, and construction administration of engineering projects and post design. Respondents shall be capable of performing all tasks associated with infrastructure projects, including grant administration, preliminary design and budgeting, facility assessment, investigation, public input, and any other task that may be requested by the Commission.

Consultant shall provide administration of any applicable loan and grant programs and provide planning and engineering services as necessary. These services shall be provided in conjunction with any applicable Federal and State programs, and in accordance with the terms defined by Lafayette County. Additional duties may include design, preparation of bid documents, prepare/coordinate/monitor contracts, process change orders, perform inspections, conduct pre construction meetings, surveying, construction management and occasional buildings/structures. The County will utilize objective criteria when evaluating and ranking qualified respondents. Engineering fees will be negotiated after ranking, in compliance with the Florida Consultants' Competitive Negotiations Act.

The County reserves the right to separate or combine projects based on the needs of the County.

Timeline: The services shall begin upon execution of a contract. The initial term shall be for a period of three (3) years with the ability to extend the services yearly based on continued satisfactory performance by the Consultant at the sole discretion of Lafayette County.

Selection Process: Procurement of these professional services shall comply with 24 C.F.R. 85.36, Chapter 287.055 Florida Statutes, the Florida's Consultants' Competitive Negotiation Act (CCNA), and Lafayette County ordinances. A Selections and Negotiations Committee will utilize essential criteria when evaluating and ranking qualified respondents. Engineering fees will be negotiated after ranking in accordance with CCNA.

Criteria:

- Similar Experience max 20 pts.
- Experience with both Design and Construction Management Services max 20 pts.
- Ability to develop and comply with various project schedules max 20 pts.
- Familiarity with various funding mechanisms max 20 pts.
- Project Management Approach and Availability of Key Personnel max 20 pts.

Negotiations: Upon completion of the ranking process, the County will then negotiate on a per project basis the scope and fees of the proposed projects. The County reserves the right to select and contract with more than one consulting firm.

Competitive Negotiations: Approval of the recommendation to award by the Lafayette County Board of County Commissioners will constitute authorization to negotiate with the top-ranked firm. The proposal package, signed by the successful proposer, along with documentation included in the proposal as required by this RFQ and other additional materials submitted by the proposer, and accepted by the County, shall be the basis for negotiation of a contract. Lafayette County shall negotiate a contract with the top ranked firm for professional services at compensation which Lafayette County determines is fair, competitive, and reasonable. The firm receiving the award shall be required to execute a truth-in-negotiation certificate stating that wage rates and other factual unit costs supporting the compensation are accurate, complete, and current at the time of contracting.

Unable to Negotiate: Should Lafayette County be unable to negotiate a satisfactory contract with the top ranked firm considered to be the most qualified at a price the County determines to be fair, competitive, and reasonable, negotiations with that firm must be formally terminated. The County shall then undertake negotiations with the next top ranked firm. Failing accord with the next top ranked firm, the agency must terminate negotiations. The County shall then undertake negotiations with the next top ranked firm. Should the County be unable to negotiate a satisfactory contract with any of the selected firms, the County shall select additional firms in the order of their competence and qualification and continue negotiations in accordance with this paragraph until an agreement is reached.

Contract: A contract shall be drafted and forwarded to the County Attorney's office for review and approval. After final review the contract will be forwarded to the firm for review and execution.

Full Contract Execution: The Public Works Department shall prepare an agenda item presenting the contracts between the successful firm and the Board of County Commissioners and request authorization for the Chairman to execute the agreement. The Board of County Commissioners retains full discretion to approve or to reject the contract.

This solicitation does not commit Lafayette County to award a contract, to pay any costs incurred in the preparation of a qualifications statement, or to procure or contract for services.

The Board of County Commissioners reserves the right to reject any and all qualifications statements received as a result of this request, to negotiate with all qualified responders, to cancel in part or in its entirety this solicitation, or re-advertise if it is in the best interest of the County to do so.

Current Conditions

Dominant Cover: This stand Has been clear cut two years ago and the current cover is various hardwoods and ag weeds.

Understory: The understory that has grown since the logging operation is ag weeds, such as hairy indigo, crotalaria, partridge pea, and native grasses.

Growth, health: The vegetation that is currently present on the property is growing at an adequate rate to be competitive to planted pines.

Desired Conditions

Dominant Cover: six hundred plus Slash pine or Longleaf pine per acre ranging from 15 feet tall and diameters should range from 3-7 inches dbh.

Understory: Comprised largely of native forbs and grasses ranging from 1 to 3 feet in height and with light to occasionally moderate density. No significant presence of exotic invasive species.

Growth, health: The crop trees healthy and vigorous with continuing growth rates at site capacity. No obvious signs of insect or fungal infestations.

Forest Management Recommendations during Contract Period

Management activities are limited to the scope and scale of the property that lies within the property lines.

Understory Control and Site-prep

Site-prep

High intensity

This site has a very prolific amount of coppicing and seed sprouting hardwoods as well as larger hardwoods that were not removed during the logging operation. These trees will compete with the future pines and cause reduced growth and survivability

Regardless of the trees planted the remaining hardwoods that frequent the landscape will need to be removed for operational reasons and competition. This can be achieved by using a root rake to remove them. Spot rake areas that have a high slash/ fuel load. Once this has been done the piles can be burnt. This method will remove most of the standing trees.

Since there is a large amount of stumps and debris on the property a chopping application will reduce the occurrence and facilitate in the planting operation. This application will also help in reducing the woody tree sprouts.

These two practices should be done in the early spring time to allow the weeds and tree sprouts to fully resprout for the herbicide application.

Bare minimum

The bare minimum amount of site prep work on this property include aerial application of herbicide to kill the competition, i.e. weeds and hardwoods. Then for planting a v-blade planter can be used to move some of the standing debris out of the way and plant seedlings in the open rows.

The difference in the two practice styles directly reflect seedling survivability and growth. Also a scalping application can be applied as well just before planting to reduce the amount of weeds and competition after the seedlings have been planted.

Planting

I recommend planting bareroot slash pine or containerized Longleaf seedlings at a rate of no more than 726 TPA on this site. The planting spacing should be a 10' X 6' spacing to achieve this TPA. When buying seedling, buy from a reputable nursery that has very good genetics and excellent quality looking trees. The better the genetics the faster and straighter the trees will grow and the less the trees will be infected with either pitch canker and fusiform rust diseases. Plant when there is adequate soil moisture to ensure survival of the containerized Longleaf pine seedlings.

This site is a sand hill that is suited for either tree, but the longleaf pine will endure drought conditions and fire that can occur naturally or by persons.

Prescribed Fire

To protect the stand from encroaching fire (and adjacent stands from escaping fire), fire lines should be installed around the perimeter of this stand and maintained, by annually disking them, during the contract period. Disking during the cooler months of the year will provide excellent native vegetation potential for wildlife, though occasionally alternating this schedule to include disking during the summer will optimize diversity of forage species and cover.

Contact the local Florida Forest Service office (850)661-2014 for a burn assistance and information and the Florida Forest Service Perry District dispatch office (850.223.0751) for burn authorizations which are only issued daily. The Florida Forest Service can be contacted to plow fire lines and either perform a standby burn or contracted burn.

- **Invasive Species Control**

- **Additional Management Requirements and Considerations:**

These recommendations are for Longleaf only and for non-pine straw production.

Since burning can cause a high mortality rate and landowners are not willing to put fire in the stand, herbicide will give you a better return on your money than any other practice. This stand could benefit from the implementation of a regimental mowing practice. This stand can either be mowed in its entirety or every third row mowed yearly. If the stand has a lot of weeds and oak saplings competing with the planted seedlings, mowing can provide more sunlight and eventually kill the saplings. The recommendation to provide a regimental mowing practice is to benefit the nesting bird population. Other than that, the field can be mowed in its entirety.

Representative Shoaf,

This letter is to request your support to keep the rate of growth for the County Medicaid Cost Share program at the same rate that has been in place since 2015-16. Next year, if F.S. 409.915(2)(e) is not changed, the rate of growth for the county Medicaid cost-share program will double.

For the past five years, the growth rate of the "County Medicaid Contributions" have increased at 50% of the percentage change in State Medicaid expenditures as provided in F.S. 409.915 (2) (d). However, F.S. 409.915 (2)(e) requires that for each year after 2019-20 the total amount of the counties' annual contribution shall be adjusted at the rate of 100 % of the % change in the state Medicaid expenditures.

The increase in the rate of growth, currently in statute, will severely impact all counties. Counties are already paying into the County Medicaid fund and there is already an appropriate provision for that fund to increase on an annual basis. However, if current statutes are not changed, the rate of growth in the County Medicaid Cost-Share will double!

In summary, we are requesting the following language or something similar, be considered as an amendment to FS 409.915(2): For the 2015-2016 state fiscal year and each state fiscal year thereafter, the total amount of the counties' annual contribution shall be the total contribution for the prior fiscal year adjusted by 50 percent of the percentage change in the state Medicaid expenditures as determined by the Social Services Estimating Conference.

Your assistance in considering this change would be greatly appreciated.
